## Mayor's Report

I want to provide another update on Town facilities issues:

- On December 4, 2025, the Ross Valley Paramedic Authority (RVPA) approved a long-term lease with the Town of Ross, keeping the paramedics in Ross where they have been for more than 40 years. The lease's 8-year term begins at the completion of the new Ross paramedic facility or January 1, 2029, whichever is sooner, and runs until approximately 2037. In addition, a year ago the RVPA Board voted unanimously that no further work would occur to separate the RVPA; over the past year, the RVPA has been strengthening the agency by revising its governance documents and financials, and in 2026 it will seek approval of these documents from members.
- Tonight Ross Valley Fire Department Chief Mahoney will present Emergency Services Response data from July 1, 2025 – October 31, 2025, a small 4-month period. Unfortunately, false information about response times (and many other items) has recently been circulated to residents, including claims that it took 16 minutes to respond to a call at Branson, and 10+ minutes to respond to an injured resident at the Post Office. In fact, based on official data, the response time to Branson was 7.5 minutes (and was for a false alarm), and 6.5 minutes to the Post Office.
- The January 8, 2026 Council meeting begins at 6 pm, to provide the Town's Elections Code Report and presentations from consultants for the Friends of the Ross Firehouse. Tonight we will discuss how best to accommodate residents if there are more than Town Hall can hold.

As we close 2025, I want to recognize and express my gratitude to the Town staff. These dedicated employees ensure that the Town runs smoothly and is extremely safe. We are fortunate to have such loyal and capable staff constantly working to enhance the lives of Ross residents. Thank you to all Ross Department Heads, along with department members:

My sincere thanks to the following organizations and their volunteers: the Ross Property Owners' Association, Ross Auxiliary, Age Friendly Ross, the Ross Historical Society, Advisory Design Review and the Town Treasurer. Our Town would not be the same without you!

## December 11, 2025 Council Meeting Highlights

### Adopting Ordinance 735: Banning the sale of Tobacco Products in the Town of Ross

Town Council adopted Ordinance 735 amending Chapter 6.18 Smoking Regulations, of the Ross Municipal Code to ban the sale of all tobacco products in the Town of Ross. This item was introduced at the November 13, 2025 meeting.



### Marin Sanitary Service Rates

Town Council conducted a public hearing and adopted Resolution No. 2546 authorizing maximum rates imposed and collected by Marin Sanitary Service for Refuse and Recyclable Material Collection and Disposal Services, effective January 1, 2026. It was also determined that the Town's franchise fees were justified by the Town's costs of providing solid waste services and reasonable charges for the use of Town property for solid waste services.

### Council Discusses Common Playfield Restoration Options

Considered by some residents to be the centerpiece of the Town, the restoration of the heavily programmed grass playfield on the Common was again a topic of discussion at the December 11<sup>th</sup> Council meeting. The Public Works Director provided background about the field and provided four restoration options to consider, ranging from maintaining "status quo" to a complete \$1 million restoration of the turf, soil, and irrigation system. The discussion between staff, Council, and the public revolved around the need to define the use and purpose of the field when considering the scope of the restoration project and the commitment of limited capital projects funding. After considering the public comment, Council directed staff to come back at the initial Capital Improvement budget discussion in February with more information on local playfield renovation projects for comparison. ### Bolinas Avenue Storm Drain Project

Construction work began last week for the Town of Ross Bolinas Avenue Storm Drain Improvement Phase 2 Project. Despite the name, almost all of the work will be within the shoulder of eastbound Sir Francis Drake Boulevard (the westerly side) as the Town installs a new 42-inch storm drain between Bolinas Avenue and the Sir Francis Drake Bridge. W.R. Forde was awarded the contract for the work in October, 2025.

As the main trench work begins (scheduled for later this week), the Town will do everything possible to keep 2-way traffic going continuously on Sir Francis Drake. Some form of traffic control will be in effect Monday through Friday from 9AM to 3PM until the Spring of 2026, so please plan ahead for delays. Since most of the work will be on Sir Francis Drake, there should be only minor impacts to traffic on Bolinas Avenue. When the project is completed, the Town's Public Works and Planning Department will work together to develop a plan to restore some of the trees and vegetation that was removed.

The bus station at the corner of Bolinas Avenue and Sir Francis Drake will be relocated to the northwest side of Bolinas Avenue along Sir Francis Drake in San Anselmo for the duration of the project.

# Please Help Protect the Ross Common

*A friendly reminder for all dog owners:*

The Ross Common is one of the town's most beloved shared spaces — a place for

residents of all ages to enjoy. Please remember, to help keep it beautiful and safe for everyone, and as stated in Municipal Code 8.04.161:

- Dogs are not permitted on the Common playfields *at any time*.
- Leashed dogs are allowed in the Grove area only.
- Unleashed dogs are allowed in the Grove area only when children are not present during the academic year.

Please do not allow your dog to dig on the fields or landscaped areas, as it damages the turf and creates hazards for others. Pick up after your dogs and dispose of waste bags in the trash to keep the Common clean and pleasant for all.

## MARIN MASTER GARDENERS

### December: Assessing & Planning Zone 0

As we enter the winter months, now is a great time to assess your landscape and plan for any adjustments you want to make to help protect your home from fire.

**Zone 0** is the area within 5 feet of your home and any attached structures such as a deck. The objective of Zone 0 is to create a fire-resistant barrier by removing combustible materials.

#### **Remove plants in Zone 0**

Instead, consider adding visual interest by designing hardscapes or rock pathways, or planting in non-combustible containers that can be moved at least 5 feet away from structures in the event of a red flag warning or high wildfire danger weather.

#### **Replace combustible mulches in Zone 0**

Use non-combustible mulches such as rocks, decomposed granite, and gravel or install hardscaping such as concrete, brick, or pavers.

#### **Replace combustible fencing adjacent to structures**

Wood fences can act like a wick for fire. Consider replacing wood fencing that connects to your home with a non-combustible material such as metal or Hardie Board.

These steps will help protect your home from fire pathways like direct flame, radiant heat, and embers.

## HOLIDAYS ARE HERE!!! HELPFUL HINTS FROM THE ROSS POST OFFICE

Staff at Ross Post Office know how important it is to get your special parcels delivered on time and in one piece! They offer the following helpful ideas:


- >Tis the season when packages are in over abundance, so mail your packages and holiday cards **early**.
- >Do not put gift cards or candy in your mailing card. If a card has ridges or is not bendable, it is considered a parcel.
- >Always put your return address on all of your cards and bills. The return address should be on the top left corner.
- >For **parcels only** being mailed to you, please have the sender use the

format: physical street address, #box number (123 Main #9999) **DO NOT** use this format for mailing envelopes or magazines.

- > Always have your wedding or other invitation cards weighed for accurate postage.
- >Do not use **RED** ink to address any cards or parcels for mailing. The computer cannot distinguish the address for accuracy.
- >Going Away? Put a vacation hold on your box. This will keep your mailbox from overflowing and keep your parcels from being returned. Please note, that parcels are held for only 15 days at all postal stations.
- >If you have a large amount of outgoing letters or small parcels, please do not drop them in the blue or wall mailbox. It clogs up the boxes and other customers cannot deposit their outgoing mail. Just bring them to the counter.
- >If you have holiday or birthday cards that are square, don't forget extra postage is required.

### RING IN THE NEW YEAR (A DAY LATER)

No collection on New Year's Day – Thursday, January 1, 2026. Service for the rest of the week will move one day later through Saturday.



### CHRISTMAS TREE COMPOSTING

#### Curbside Pickup:

January 5–16 on your regular collection day.

- Remove all ornaments, lights, tinsel, and tree stands.
- Trees over 6 feet in length must be cut in half.
- Place your tree on the curb or cut up in your compost cart.

#### Compostables Cart:

- Cut trees into smaller sections that fit with the lid closed.

#### Drop-Off:

- Up to 2 unflocked trees free at the Marin Resource Recovery Center, 565 Jacoby Street, San Rafael.
- Flocked or plastic trees must be disposed at a charge.



### EXTRA! EXTRA!

#### Cardboard:

- Bundle smaller loads (2'x2'x2') with twine and place next to your recycling cart.
- 15+ boxes? Call to schedule a free pickup.
- Free drop-off at the Marin Resource Recovery Center.

**Garbage:** Call to schedule and to receive a collection quote.

### TIME FOR A CLEAR-OUT? YOUR CLEANUP WEEK IS COMING

Twice a year (once in fall and once in spring) residents get a Curbside Clean-up Week. On your regular service day, you can set out up to 14 bags of extra material at no extra charge. Clean-up dates are available on [marinsanitaryservice.com](http://marinsanitaryservice.com).

Join us in composting your Christmas tree to create healthy soils.

## General Guidelines for All Trees

*Plastic/flocked trees cannot be composted and must go in landfill.*

- ✔ Remove the tree stand. ✔ Remove all decorations: lights, ornaments, tinsel, etc.
- ✔ If you live in an apartment building, ask the landlord to set up one day for tree collection for the building.

### Curbside Collection:

Don't know who your waste hauler is? Visit <https://zerowastemarin.org/who-is-my-hauler/>

#### Bay Cities Refuse

- No date restrictions: put your tree on the curb or cut it to fit in your green bin. Trees 7ft+ must be cut in half.

#### Marin Sanitary Service

- 1/5/26 - 1/16/26 place your tree on the curb on your regular collection day. Trees 6 ft+ must be cut in half.
- Or, cut tree into pieces and place it in your green compost cart, as long as the lid closes.
- Trees set out after 1/16/26 may be collected for \$5.00. Customers must call to request pick-up after 1/16/26.

#### Mill Valley Refuse Service

- 1/5/26 - 1/16/26 place your tree on the curb on your regular collection day. Trees must be cut into pieces four feet or less in length.
- Or, cut your holiday tree into pieces and place it in your green compost cart, as long as the lid closes.
- After 1/16/25 an additional fee may apply.

#### Recology Sonoma Marin

- For customers in Novato: 1/5/26 - 1/9/26 place your tree on the curb, or cut up the tree and place in your cart (lid must close).
- For customers in West Marin: Either cut up the tree to fit inside your green cart (lid must close), or drop off your tree at a drop-off location.

#### Tamalpais Community Services District

- 1/6/26 - 1/9/26 place your tree on the curb on your regular collection day. Trees 6 ft+ must be cut in half.
- Or, cut tree into 2 foot pieces and place it in your green compost cart, as long as the lid closes.
- \$30 charge for collection before 1/6 or after 1/9.

Drop off at College of Marin, 700 College Ave Parking Lot #12 (south of the gym).

#### Larkspur: 1/2/26 - 1/16/26

- Niven Park, Drakes Landing Rd & Barry Way

#### Marin Resource Recovery Center:

During the month of January, customers can drop off up to 2 trees for free at 565 Jacoby St in San Rafael. There will be a charge for flocked trees.

#### Marinwood: 1/2/26 - 1/16/26

Drop off at Marinwood Community Center, 775 Miller Creek Road, in the parking lot.

#### Point Reyes: 12/26/25 - 1/16/26

Point Reyes Fire Station (4th & B St), 8am - 5pm.

#### Ross: 1/2/26 - 1/16/26

Drop off at Marin Art & Garden Center, 30 Sir Francis Drake Drive. Do not drop off trees at the fire station.

#### Sausalito: 12/29/25 - 1/31/26

Drop off at the MLK parking lot off Coloma Street.

#### San Rafael: 1/2/26 - 1/16/26

- Pickleweed Park, 50 Canal St
- Scotty's Market Parking Lot, 620 Manual T Freitas Pkwy

#### Stinson/Bolinas: Mondays, Wed - Sat

Drop off at Bolinas-Stinson Resource Recovery Park, 25 Olema Bolinas Road, 9am - 4:30pm.


## Reporting Safety Concerns to PG&E

# How to tell the difference between lines

If you see a pole with three sets of wires, the top two are powerlines. The lowest line is a communications line. Communications lines are owned by vendors like AT&T and Comcast. Any issues with these lines should be reported to the appropriate vendor.



## Use *Report It* to report your concerns about PG&E electric systems:

### Trees or vines that are by a powerline and have:

- Tree branches within 4 feet of primary lines
- Tree branches causing strain or abrasion to secondary lines
- Dead and dying trees within striking distance of PG&E assets
- Strain or abrasion to service drop or communication lines

### Powerlines that are:

- Frayed
- Low or sagging
- Buzzing
- Experiencing an object caught on the line

### Powerline poles that are:

- Leaning more than 10%
- Burned
- Cracked
- Decayed/rotten
- Vandalized

### Electrical equipment that is:

- Leaking
- Buzzing or making a loud noise
- Severely corroded

## Call PG&E for issues that need immediate attention:

Some issues may require immediate attention and should not be reported through the app. If you encounter the following, please call [1-800-743-5002](tel:1-800-743-5002):

- Mylar® balloon caught in a powerline
- Broken power pole
- Broken cross arm on pole
- Open site enclosure
- Exposed electrical wires
- Issues with gas equipment

For emergency reports, please call 911 and then when you are in an area you deem safe, call 800-743-5000 and press #2 to report the emergency to PG&E. If you are reporting downed power lines, smell of gas, or another nearby emergency, get away from the unsafe area and then make the calls.
