## Mayor's Report

First, I want to showcase Firewise, a volunteer community-based organization that provides simple, effective steps to help reduce the risk of destruction from wildfires by encouraging residents to take proactive steps. Some California insurance companies offer homeowner insurance discounts if a residence is in a Firewise site.

Currently Marin has 90 Firewise groups, encompassing more than 25% of Marin's population and geography. In addition to the Barber-Winship Firewise Group approved six years ago, Ross has two other Firewise groups:

- The Laurel Grove Firewise Community recently became Firewise USA certified – congratulations! This Firewise site includes Laurel Grove and streets off Laurel Grove in Ross, Kentfield and San Rafael.
- The Lagunitas Road Firewise was recently launched and is making big strides toward becoming Firewise-certified. This site will include about 200 homes south of Lagunitas Road and West of Sir Francis Drake Boulevard on Willow, Willow Hill, Madrona, portions of Lagunitas, Thomas Court, Woodside, Bridge and Poplar. ## February 12, 2026 Council Meeting Highlights



### New 4-Way Stop Intersection

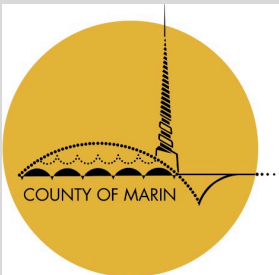
Installation of a 4-way stop intersection at the intersection of Bellagio Road, Canyon Road, and Winding Way in the Town of Ross.

Town Council approved updating the current single stop sign on northbound Canyon Road at the 4-way intersection to a four-way stop intersection to improve pedestrian and vehicular safety at the intersection of Bellagio Road, Canyon Road, and Winding Way (the intersection). The new signage will be installed as soon as the weather clears and the work can be scheduled.

### Ad Hoc Advisory Committee

The Town Council took no action on the formation of an Ad Hoc Advisory Committee

The Council received public comment from Ross residents Jeff Kuhn and Bob Herbst, that a seven-member Citizens Advisory Committee had been formed to consider the best and most economic way forward with the redevelopment of the Town's Civic Center.



### Certification of Sufficiency - Friends of Ross Firehouse (FORF) Initiative

The Town Council received and filed the Certification of Sufficiency of the petition for the proposed citizen-initiative entitled "Friends of Ross Firehouse Initiative". The Council also adopted [Resolution No. 2609](#) to order the submission of the FORF initiative to the consolidated general election to be held on Tuesday, November 3, 2026.

### Draft Fee Study Report

The Town Council received a presentation from staff, and NBS consultant Nicole Kissam, of the draft Fee Study Report including the evaluation of fees for services for Administration and Finance, Planning, Building, Public Works, Police and General Plan Updates.



### Housing & Architectural/Engineering RFQ's

The Town Council voted to move forward with the publication of the Request for Qualifications (RFQ) for both the 9 units of housing required by the Town's Housing Element and the architectural and engineering for the Civic Center project.

## Extending the Terms of Mayor & Mayor Pro Tempore

In August 2025, the Town Council adopted Ordinance No. 730 to move the Town of Ross elections from the date of the statewide direct primary election in March or June to the statewide general election in November. Extending the terms of the Mayor and MPT moves the end of their terms from June to November syncing the reorganization of the Council going forward.



## Council Awards Bonus



In recognition of her performance over the past year, the Council awarded the Town Manager, Christa Johnson, a 5% performance and retention bonus. Appointed by the Council in November 2021, the bonus reflects the Council's evaluation of her work and demonstrates its confidence in her performance and its commitment to retaining experienced administrative leadership for ongoing municipal operations and priorities.

## 2026 Tennis Court Access Keys Are Now Available For Purchase!

Keys provide residents with annual access to the Town of Ross multi-use tennis and pickleball courts and are renewed at the end of December each year.



### Important Notes:

- Town of Ross Residents, Ross Business Owners, RSD
- Staff, and families currently enrolled in Ross School are eligible to purchase keys. Proof of residency is required at the time of key pickup. One key per resident
- \$125 annual fee (prorated fees start in June)
- \$25 for first replacement key (after first replacement, keyholder must purchase additional replacements at current rate)
- No reservations - first come, first served

**Beyond Zone 0**, drought-tolerant plants and thoughtful layouts help yards stay green, inviting, and easy to care for. It's also a perfect place to create defined outdoor areas for gathering, play, and everyday use.

Resilient yards aren't empty. They are an opportunity to create an area that requires less water, less upkeep, and more space for enjoying time with your friends and family.

### MARIN COUNTY CIVIL GRAND JURY... GIVE SOME THOUGHT TO PARTICIPATING

Our lives are most directly affected by what happens here in our county. People look at Marin as a community of wealthy people living an idyllic lifestyle. But we are not immune to the problems of the nation and we have serious issues that need to be addressed now.

Each of us must be part of the solution. Marin is a marvelous place to call home but it needs us all to make a contribution. Volunteering to serve on the [Marin County Civil Grand Jury](#) provides us with a unique civic opportunity to fulfill this responsibility by being of service to our own community.

The civil grand jury differs from criminal grand juries, which are assembled to consider potential criminal wrongdoing. It is empaneled by the Marin County Superior Court to serve as a citizens' watchdog over the roughly 125 local government agencies that serve Marin. The jury's charge is to investigate local government operations and then offer recommendations that help them be more efficient, effective, transparent and accountable. The civil grand jury is independent and free to determine the agencies and issues that it will investigate.

Juries focus on those topics where they can make a helpful recommendation to improve Government service and the quality of life in Marin. The jury reports its findings and recommendations to the people of Marin County and to the elected officials, who have responsibility for overseeing the entities that have been investigated.

Between the county board of supervisors, city and town councils, school and special district boards, and countywide elected officials like the sheriff, tax collector, assessor, and others, Marin has more than 285 elected public officials. These representatives are required by law to respond to the findings and recommendations of the jury. This is an opportunity to have citizens contribute to our local government. Civil grand jurors serve a one-year term, beginning in July. The jury consists of 19 members and 11 alternates. Each session inevitably leaves jurors enriched and proud of the issues they investigated and reported on. The positive responses that we have received from elected officials are particularly gratifying. Past reports covered transportation, mental health, justice, housing, civil responsibilities, education, workforce development, aging, electrical and water infrastructure facilities. All these reports and their responses can be seen by the public on the Marin Civil Grand Jury website.

Take some time and read the reports. Hopefully, the thought and quality of these and other reports will inspire you to join Marin's next civil grand jury. Applications are now open for the 2026-2027 Marin Civil Grand Jury. Applicants must be 18 years or older, a U.S. citizen and a Marin County resident for at least one year. Applications can be completed online.

# Save the Date for the 2026 Eco-Friendly Garden Tour

The 2026 Eco-Friendly Garden Tour will take place on **Saturday, May 9th** from **10:00am to 4:00pm!**

The Eco-Friendly Garden Tour is an annual tour showcasing local homes and gardens that have crafted beautiful, low water use, sustainable landscapes. It aims to demonstrate how native landscaping can be even more beautiful than traditional landscaping styles.

The self-guided tour will take place across Sonoma and Marin counties. It's a great way to celebrate gardening, find inspiration for your own projects, and connect with like-minded people!



Last year's tour featured 19 gardens and saw over 3,600 registrations. Local organizations provided educational information and advice at many of the gardens. The 2026 tour is expected to be even better!

## MARIN MASTER GARDENERS

### February: Assessing and Planning Zones 1 & 2

Defensible space is divided into three actively managed landscape zones that collectively reduce your risk of losing your home to wildfire.

Start in Zone 0, the first 5 ft of your house. Best practice is to keep this zone clear of anything that can burn.

Next, assess Zone 1, the area 5-30 ft from your home. Focus on plant size, spacing, and maintenance.

**Zone 1 Objective:** Reduce potential fire and heat close to your house

- Separate plantings with hardscape, such as decorative pebbles, to help slow and potentially stop fire from spreading to your home.
- By creating space between plantings and keeping your plants well-maintained you can help firefighters more effectively and safely access and protect your home during a fire.
- For areas closer to the home, select low-growing, low-maintenance plants and keep them appropriately irrigated.
- Limb up trees so a fire in low shrubs/groundcover vegetation cannot reach the lowest limbs and ignite the tree canopy.
- Composted wood chips or small to medium-sized bark are good mulch choices. Limit mulch depth to 2" and separate areas of mulch with hardscaping.
- If your property has a Zone 2, which extends 30 to 100 feet from the home, you have more flexibility.

**Zone 2 Objective:** Decrease the intensity and flame length of a fire by reducing plant density

- Larger shrubs and trees can be utilized in this zone.
- Continue to separate planting groups with hardscape or well hydrated mown grass or mulch. Additional space between planting is needed on slopes.
- Remove all dead vegetation.
- Cut grass and weeds to 4" once they turn yellow/brown.
- Continue to keep vegetation under trees low to the ground below trees to avoid fire reaching into the trees and into the tree canopies
- You may wish to collaborate with your neighbors to plan out this defensible zone while maintaining privacy.

Creating defensible space from your home out to your property line by focusing on fire smart spacing and good plant maintenance, you are significantly decreasing your home's risk from wildfire.

### Tips To Reduce Food Waste

#### Plan Before You Shop

- Check your fridge and pantry before you go to the store to see what you already have
- Plan what meals you want to make ahead of time
- Make a list of what you need



#### Properly Store Your Food

- Keep potatoes separate from onions to prevent sprouting
- Herbs like basil can be stored in a cup of water like flowers
- Store fruits separately from veggies and use reusable containers to prevent drying out

#### Don't Ghost Your Leftovers

- Make a "eat this first" section of the fridge for food that will spoil quicker
- Get creative with leftover food; e.g. broth from veggie scraps!



#### Compost What You Can't Save

- For inedible food, make sure to compost it instead of sending it to the landfill
- Establish your food scrap compost set up: use a container in the freezer, an under-sink space, or a counter-top pail.

## Calling All STEM Students: Apply for PG&E College Scholarships of Up to \$10,000

The Better Together STEM Scholarship Program has grown over the years to assist more students and families.

In 2023, the PG&E Foundation added a new \$5,000 scholarship that expanded the program to include additional recipients. In 2022, students attending Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) throughout the United States became eligible in response to more students applying who planned to attend HBCUs.

### Deadline and criteria

**Interested applicants can learn more and apply [here](#). The deadline to apply is March 12, 2026.** Scholarships will be awarded by August.

Scholarships are based on academic achievement as well as demonstrated participation and leadership in school and community activities. They are also based on personal triumph and financial need. Students must pursue qualifying degrees in STEM disciplines. These disciplines include engineering, computer science/information systems, cybersecurity, environmental sciences, math and physics.

Applications are open to:

- High school seniors or graduates
- Students who have received a GED certification
- Current undergraduate students
- Non-traditional students or military veterans returning to school or pursuing their first undergraduate degree
- Those who reside in PG&E's Northern or Central California service area or a dependent of a resident in the service area
- Students planning full-time undergraduate enrollment for 2026-2027
- Those seeking their first undergraduate degree at an accredited four-year California institution or HBCU

In addition to the Better Together STEM Scholarship Program, PG&E's 11 employee resource groups (ERGs) and two engineering networking groups (ENGs) are awarding more than \$300,000 in scholarships to help offset the cost of higher education. The funds are raised through coworker donations, coworker fundraising events and the company's coworker giving program.
