Did you know there is a jail located below Town Hall? I have been on the Council for 11 years and I didn't know there was a jail at Town Hall until a few months ago when someone mentioned that Town

staff was cleaning out old boxes "in the jail". Immediately I requested to see the historical Ross jail.

A few weeks ago, I needed to tour other Town facilities as we continue to discuss upgrading the civic center buildings and it had been a number of years since I last entered some of them. I took a tour of part of the fire facilities which have been shut down because they are not habitable. The portion of the firehouse that has been shut down is in terrible shape. Mayor Pro Tem Bill Kirchner, Chief Pata and Town Manager Johnson did the tour with me. For any of you who think that the facilities do not need to be replaced, or who hold to the view that they can be repaired, I can assure you,

Fire-Smart Tips from the UC Master Gardeners

NOVEMBER: Plant Spacing in Fire-smart Landscapes

Horizontal spacing:

- It is ideal to remove all plants within 5 feet of structures.
- Plant density can increase the further away from structures you get.
- Separate groups of plants with hardscaping to help slow down or prevent the spread of fire.
- On a **mild slope** (0-20% slope), space trees at least 10 feet apart from their dripline and space shrubs 2x their height from each other.
- On a **medium slope** (20-40%), space trees at least 20 feet apart and shrubs 4x their height.
- On a **steep slope** (over 40%), space trees at least 30 feet apart and shrubs 6x their height.
- Avoid planting trees in rows or hedges.

Vertical spacing:

- Remove tree branches that are within 6 feet from the ground on trees that are 18 feet or taller.
- If shrubs are under a tree, maintain a vertical clearance of 3x the shrub's height between the top of the shrub to the lowest branch of the tree.
- When creating vertical space under trees, prioritize the tree's health by ensuring that the upper twothirds of the tree has branches.

After we finished the tour of the fire house, we went over to Town Hall to surprise Town Manager Christa Johnson for her birthday, which Councilmembers Julie McMillan and Elizabeth Robbins kindly organized. After coffee and cupcakes, we all agreed to tour the jail together. Below is a photograph of the Council with Chief Pata and Christa Johnson in the jail. (Council Member Beach Kuhl wanted the photo to be titled "In Jail ... where they belong" but I did not think that was very funny or appropriate.)

If the size of the jail is any indication, we had very few criminal offenders in Ross because the jail is quite small. Be-

ing in the jail made me feel a little anxious – if the door shut on you, I am not sure anyone could hear you in there. Also, the wifi did not work.

I think when we do rebuild the civic center facilities, we must keep the Town jail. Like the walk-in safe that exists in the Town Clerk's office, also pictured, the Town jail is part of our past and we should maintain it for the future.

Tips from Ross PD

Trending This Month: November is the start of Holiday Season!

With the Holidays on the horizon, some of us will travel to see family and friends.

Excitement for holiday travel is tempered with the thought of leaving your home and valuables for more than a couple of days. There are a few things you can do to help keep your home safe and you more secure about going on your holiday adventures.

- Hold. Place a hold on mail and newspapers during your trip. Mail delivery is not really a problem in Ross, but if you have any packages or newspapers that stack up, those are clues that you're not home. Ask a neighbor to pick those up for you while you're gone.
- Noise. Leave a talk radio station on at home. The sound of people talking might scare a would-be burglar. Most burglars do not want to come face to face with residents, so hearing voices in the house might be helpful.
- Lights. Leaving lights on at the front porch or rear of the home can be a deterrent. Some burglars will unscrew the light so they can't be seen forcing entry. If you have a light that is out of reach, they are less likely (or able) to disable it. An advanced maneuver is to have lights come on automatically in your home. You can buy an inexpensive timer at the hardware store, or you can get an app for "smart lights".
- Cameras. Install cameras at the front and rear of your home. Be careful not to place them up too high. A camera that looks down will give law enforcement a good view of the top of the suspect's head and not their face. Lower your camera to a level that will capture the bad guy's face.
- Check. If you will be gone for more than a weekend, fill out the Ross PD on-line form for a Vacation House Check. You can find it on our website at: https://www.townofross.org/police/webform/vacation-checkform.
